Music as a Pandemic Priority

Dear Friends,

I hope you are well. 2019-2020 threw us all a curve ball. I've certainly paused and thought more deeply about life and priorities. At the onset of the fiscal and academic year in Fall 2019, Pakachoag Music School was sharply focused on increasing organizational diversity and in doing our part to create more equal access, locally and nationally, to high quality arts instruction. Our goals pulled from a freshly approved three year Strategic Plan, tied closely to grant-driven initiatives.

Now, as we close the fiscal year, what has transpired these past six months — sickness, job losses, and national disagreement — has created a greater sense of urgency to our work. Our country is fractured and conflicted as we question priorities around healthcare, jobs and education. Our individuality has been rattled as we experience various degrees of isolation and fatigue of everything 'remote'.

For me, the urgency at hand is to provide students and families the knowledge and tools to use the full potential of the arts to create strong learners, leaders and innovators; at the same time, we aspire to create a fuller understanding of the arts as a path for not only self-fulfillment, but for constructive community change and dialogue. Within the disruptions, coupled with this sense of urgency, we have remained grounded because of your support. Your care and generosity has been with us, if not in-person, certainly in spirit.

We've also been reminded this year, by parents and many in the larger community, that the arts and music can be a powerful ally for maintaining mental health. Music allows us to explore, to process, to express and interpret ideas and emotions around norms, old and new traditions, *and* the unexpected.

So here we are! Four seemingly disparate nouns: Civility, change, mental health, beauty. Except, through the complexities of music (and the arts), interconnections abound. Your giving brings this interconnected power of music into the lives of individual students. Your giving has provided the anchor that has allowed us to stand tall and firmly during our FY20. *Most importantly, your giving has allowed the beauty of music to play on throughout the past year, at a time when we needed the beauty of music in every way.* Thank you.

Music Safari: Beginning Keyboard

GRANTS AND GIFTS PROVIDE THE FLEXIBILITY & RISK-TAKING NEEDED FOR CHANGE

In spring 2019, Pakachoag Music School was thrilled to receive a Creative Engagement grant underwritten by the Greater Worcester Community Foundation (GWCF) in partnership with the Boston-based Barr Foundation. Our work related to that grant kicked off at the beginning of this past fiscal year, September 2019.

In late fall 2019, we received a new grant from The Klarman Family Foundation through its Music Pathways for Youth portfolio to similarly support the mission and organizational goals of the School as it seeks to build capacity, expand community engagement and increase organizational diversity.

One step toward achieving these goals is testing out new programs that respond to different interests and which offer an easier entry point into the School's more structured Private Lesson program. Our new Music Safari Keyboard class was a test run.

We are really happy to report that the program has proved popular, educationally strong, and fun! Close to 70% of last year's participants are back for a second year (albeit remotely). One student has rotated into private lessons to date.

Sarah Okerlund, who joined our faculty specifically to teach these classes, holds bachelor's and master's degrees in music education from Oberlin College Conservatory.

Music Safari introduces students to the keyboard, develops basic musicianship skills, and uses music exploration as part of learning.

Partner Spotlight

African Community Education (ACE)

In 2019, we made friends with the ACE program which provides after-school programs in the basement at All Saints, two floors below us. ACE staff introduced us to students anxious to learn an instrument. We revised our financial aid forms to include partner referrals, recognizing that many of the parents of ACE students are new to the English language, to forms and payment plans.

In December, Pakachoag students played holiday music for the ACE students, and in January, School faculty visited the Saturday ACE program to introduce more students and parents to the School.

ACE Program Director Lauren shared in Fall of 2019: "Dear Sarah and the Pakachoag Music School, thank you from the bottom of our hearts @ ACE. The opportunity that you've provided us has been truly gracious and inspiring. The students always seem to leave their lessons on top of the world, and they look forward to Tuesdays for sure. Benchmarks & What We Know

We estimated in FY19 that 16% of lesson students likely identified as non-white. We set a two year goal, as part of our strategic planning, to move that number to 24%.

We actually hit 27% of families identifying as non-white in FY20 for all enrollees; and 42% among private lesson students (where our growth goals are focused).

Diversity expanded this past year through partnerships and connections made within the local neighborhood.

We're committed to continuing to create more equal access to high quality music instruction for persons of all backgrounds, all ages and needs.

Program & Enrollment Trends

360 Individuals Served FY20 vs. 402 in FY19, A 10% Decline

GRANDPARENTS "TRENDING"

This past year, we saw more grandparents bringing grandchildren to Music Together (MT) classes. The MT curriculum, driven by decades of research, is designed to nurture a lifelong musical bond between parent — or grandparent — and child.

Everyone gets to sing, dance and become musically successful when we make Music Together. Unfortunately, MT is the program that took the biggest hit due to COVID-19. As of year end, MT enrollment was down by 60% over prior year.

COVID-19 DISRUPTIONS

From September to February, Private Lesson enrollment was following an upward curve, signaling we were back-on-track to meeting our *On The Move* growth goals. In March, we pivoted to online learning for all programs. Ninety percent of lesson students continued remotely; but only 50% of MT families chose to enroll for remote spring classes.

On a brighter note, summer lesson income actually doubled over the prior year due to cancelled vacations among both faculty and continuing students. We cancelled all summer group camps and related programs. New student enrollment slowed for both spring and summer presenting additional challenges as we maneuvered through the pandemic.

Looking backwards, the pleasure of welcoming over 150 guests to the Martin Luther King Jr. Day program in January stands out as THE unexpected highlight of the year—both in terms of the nature of the event and in stark contrast to what we missed in the absence of community music-making.





Fiscal Year 20 COVID-19 Impact

The FY20 budget was the second year of a three-year budget plan to grow in order to adjust to the obligations of a new home.

While we had already planned to pull from reserves, COVID-19 threw a wrench into the works. Cultural organizations have faced a myriad of challenges; for Pakachoag, primarily in the form of revenue losses from lost enrollments.

Generous grantors and donors cushioned the impact. Greater Worcester Community Foundation's Worcester Together Fund, managed in partnership with the United Way, played a significant role in minimizing losses. Several individual contributors made 2nd gifts during the summer months to help.

A PPP Loan, if successfully converted to grant support in FY21, will further assist our recovery.

Thank you for assisting us in slowing the draw from cash reserves. We remain strong because of your support.



The Verderese Volunteer of the Year

Brian Perry, Retired Banker; Board Treasurer

Brian Perry embraced the Pakachoag mission five years ago, overseeing us, financially, through our move and now through COVID-19.

Brian loves to tell the story of how I cornered him his first week of lessons to ask him if he might consider getting involved as a volunteer. That's because when Brian called to inquire about lessons, he mentioned he was retiring after a lifetime career in banking, and he wanted to learn to play the fiddle. On January 4th, 2016 one week post retirement, Brian arrived for his first lesson.

Knowing we could use assistance from someone who can read financial statements, yes, I cornered Brian to volunteer and he gratefully agreed. Beyond serving as Treasurer, Brian spent many hours assisting with our search for a new home, calling realtors, connecting with local business leaders, attending space meetings, and managing financial models and projections.

Volunteers make a HUGE difference in the life of non-profits—whether as board member, committee member sharing skills or knowledge, or hands-on in office or at events. Thank you Brian, and all of the volunteers who are furthering the mission and vision of Pakachoag Music School.

I can't imagine going through the current pandemic without music. We're shut off from so many experiences -- no concerts at Mechanics Hall, no recitals at Pakachoag, no choral groups to sing with -- that making some kind of music at home has been more important to me than ever. I can't do that in a vacuum: I need the conversations with an (incredibly patient) teacher to help me listen to, think about, and find meaning in the music I'm trying to play.

Adult Learners

Adult students are a growing population at Pakachaog.

- In FY18, 13% of private lesson students were over the age of 19.
- In FY19, 18%; and
- In FY20, 20%

Some of our adult students tell us they used to play or sing as a child; others are completely new to music. A few have been playing recently and are looking for the next step-up.

Interesting Notes About Adult Learners

Some of the questions we receive from adults asking about lessons include:

- *Is there any instrument that is not appropriate for an adult learner?* No—unless one has a physical impairment which might impact the specific demands of a particular instrument.
- Can I progress the same as a school-age learner? That is a complicated question which depends entirely upon the individual. Teaching adults can be challenging. Adult learners often want to know everything at once and have expectations for progressing quickly; vs. school-aged students are used to taking things one step at a time which is really the way it needs to happen.
- Can I play a Mozart Sonata after one year? I'm just getting started. Sorry—but probably not! Music lessons work best when approached as a long-term commitment, and some music is a bit more complicated than it may sound or look.

Connecting In New Ways Looking Ahead

As we closed the fiscal year in August 2019, we kicked off the new Pakachoag Connect program thanks to seed funding from close friends of the School, including board members.


Pakachoag Connect, when fully brought to fruition, will offer online learning options across all program areas, from early childhood to adult—using equipment that provides a strong audio and visual online experience.

Our desire for the long-term is to use Pakachoag Connect to ease access for families and children, especially those who cannot get to the School in-person for a weekly lesson. Families receiving financial aid, who may have limited technology access, would also be supported with technology loans and guidance for home learning. Most will be able to choose a combination of remote and in-person to help balance busy family schedules.

While some programs, like our Fiddle Band ensemble, will revert to fully in-person post-COVID, we will continue to offer remote learning options for lessons and some classes for the long-term.

Our commitment to online learning was actually part of the School's Three Year Strategic Plan, not just a reaction to COVID-19, although COVID prompted us to pull this initiative forward in terms of priority.

Much more remains to be done to bring our vision to full fruition, but we thank individual donors and board members who have provided seed funding to get the program started.
